TOP TRAY COMPETITION RULES

- 1. The Millom & Broughton Show Top Tray Class is for a collection of three types of Vegetables from the following list of eight. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets: carrots (3); runner beans (6 pods); cauliflowers (2); onions (3); parsnips (3); peas (6 pods); potatoes (3); tomatoes (6). Each type of vegetable will be judged out of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows: seven points for size, shape and colour; seven points for condition; six points for uniformity. The overall mark will therefore will be out of 60.
- 2. All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 457 x 610mm / 18" x 24" without bending any of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray board measuring 457 x 610mm / 18" x 24" can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lid or edge, it is the internal measurement that must not exceed 457 x 610mm / 18" x 24"
- A black cloth is permitted and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but no other foliage or accessories such as plates, sand rings and so on will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied with raffia or string.
- The winner of the Millom & Broughton Top Tray will receive £5, second place £3 and third place £2.

Notes for Exhibitors and Judges

- Carrots and Parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 75mm / 3"
- · Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached
- Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case)
- Judges may handle exhibits, open pods and so on to check for quality
- Judges shall use their discretion when judging the Top Tray Class, bearing in mind that the entries may not come from regular exhibitors
- The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitor's cards
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to and decided by the Show Officials
- · Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification

TOP VASE COMPETITION RULES

- The Millom & Broughton Show Top Vase Class is a vase of mixed flowers containing a total
 of 5 and 10 stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. PLEASE note that
 this is two different KINDS of plants; two different varieties of the same flower are NOT two
 kinds.
- The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into: 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display; 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the plants in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be normal Royal Horticultural Society rules.
- Plants used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seeds or heads of berries allowed.
- 4. The vase can be any shape or size made from any material but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
- No accessories such as bows and additional foliage will be allowed. Foliage which is
 growing naturally from the flowering stem and is still attached to that stem, is allowed.
 Packing material, including florists' foam to keep the stems upright and in place, is allowed.
- 6. The winner of the Millom & Broughton Top Vase will receive £5, second place £3 and third place £2.

Notes for Exhibitors and Judges

- A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
- The Top Vase class is open for anyone to enter and is not purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows.
- Judges should use their discretion when judging the Top Vase Class, bearing in mind that the entries may not come from regular exhibitors.
- . Judges should note that the display has to be viewed from all around.
- The points should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the Show Officials.
- Failure to abide by these rules will lead to disqualification.
